The March 8, 2003 meeting was held at the Nevada Public Library Community Room with 20 members and guests present.

Susan McBeth spoke to our group about the Nevada Public Library, her background, and her staff and their qualifications. Following her presentation, there was a question and answer session. One of the items discussed was that the Genealogy Room, being a part of the Library, was Susan's responsibility. (She previously thought that it belonged to the Genealogical Society.) Susan is going to dispose of the broken, unrepairable microfilm reader and connect a printer to the microfilm reader which current does not have printing capabilities. Additionally, she will make the book copier operational and provide instruction on its use (that's the large piece of equipment sitting in the corner). We discussed the possibility of getting a paid subscription for AncestryPlus.com (library edition), and Susan will look into that. She reported that we could obtain a Kansas City Public Library card (for free) and access Ancestry.com from our homes; however, upon checking further, she has found that that is not correct.

sheet will be prepared for the seminar packets with Society information and a membership form inviting participants to join the Society. Neoma Foreman and Dorothy Foster prepared and mailed seminar flyers to historical and genealogy groups in the region as well as libraries and individuals. There will be news articles in area newspapers. This will be a great seminar. Everyone's cooperation and work are greatly appreciated!

Research begins with identifying the correct county jurisdiction, and this book can help you do that. It was later reported that El Dorado Springs library did have a copy of this book, so a copy has been presented to the Nevada Library.

What's Too Much? What's Too Little?

When you write a letter or an email asking for help with your family history, you need to give

enough information to get a good response, without overwhelming the recipient with too much information. But how much is that?

Here are a couple of suggestions.

DO INCLUDE a precise definition of the person you're asking about. That means his or her full name, birth date or age, and the relevant date, event and place you are inquiring about.. If it's a question about military service, that would include when and where he served and his unit. If it's a question about her schooling, that would include when and where she attended school. If you don't know the exact details, provide your best approximations.

DO NOT INCLUDE an extensive family history. Few questions require three generations of the family's history or the minute details of a person's daily schedule. Unless it is essential to your question, don't go on at length about the multitude of family members. Keep your initial query focused on one person and one question, and offer to provide other details in a followup if needed.

And on the lighter side...a fellow researcher sends the following:

Dear Abby:

I have always wanted to have my family history traced, but I can't afford to spend a lot of money to do it. Any suggestions?

Sam

Dear Sam:

Yes. Run for public office. Abby
