Do You Have An Old Yearbook?

Yearbooks open up dozens of memories for those pictured inside the pages.

But yearbooks that are part of the keepsakes from an estate are not as interesting. The problem of disposing of these treasures arises when there is no family member that wants to keep this reminder of a loved one's younger years. However it doesn't seem right to toss such things away.

The Tri-County Genealogical Society has the answer for you. They have a project to preserve the history of all of our Vernon County schools, even those no longer in existence. One of the best tools for this project is to maintain a complete set of the yearbooks from each school. Some of these are smaller Annuals. Other are elaborate publications. All are needed.

Donating school yearbooks to the Genealogical Society is a wonderful tribute to the graduates, the school and our county's history.

It is explained that one copy of each year's book will be placed in the Nevada Public Library genealogy department where it will be available for use during regular library hours.

Some books are frail from use or age. These will have individual pages placed in protective sleeves so that they can be used without damage to the pages.

Pages from the books can be copied in the library, but the books cannot be checked out. Therefore you know that your donation will be

well cared for and will remain in the library for future use.

A second copy of each yearbook will be donated to the Bushwhacker Museum where it will be preserved in their archives.

Some schools, such as Metz school, have been working for several years to collect copies of their school's yearbooks. This is a very good project.

However the Genealogical Society still wants to have a separate collection of these same books so that the complete history of all the schools will be available in two locations.

Some books are available now in the Genealogy Department. These include four from Bronaugh (1956, '57, '59 and '87); four from Sheldon (1977-'80); and 10 from Walker (the '60s and early '70s). Of special interest are the ones from Saint Francis Academy. Several have been donated from 1954 through 1966. Needed are all years of Northeast Vernon County, Richards and Schell City.

Even though Metz alumni have been searching for their books for three years they still need 1954, '59 and '71 for the Genealogy Department and other years from 1936 through 1984 for the Museum.

Copies of the Nevada yearbooks are needed for 1909, '10, '15, most of the '30s, and some more recent issues. It is hoped that some can be found from 1905 or earlier if there were books printed in those years.

The Genealogical Society is also interested in any written histories of the schools. Any newsletters or histories will be made available on the genealogy Web site. This information can be sent to the Genealogy Society in care of Nevada Library or emailed TriCountyGenealogy@starband.net.

Donated books can be taken to the Nevada Public Library. For more information contact the society.

Let's work together to keep this precious historical heritage available for everyone to see.

Nine indexes to Sheldon Enterprise newspaper abstract books were recently placed online. These cover the years 1901-1931 and 1936. The four additional Sheldon indexes will be placed online later this summer. The indexes allow researchers to see if their family member was "in the news," and gives information on how researchers can order a copy of the newspaper article(s) for a small fee.

1885 Burial in Green Mound Cemetery

Neoma Foreman got a call from a granddaughter of Joseph and Mary Harter with additional information about a baby buried years ago in Green Mound Cemetery. Neoma wanted to share the following interesting story: "A carnival or street fair came to Harwood and one of the families had a sick baby. Dr. Walker directed them to Joseph and Mary Harter for help in caring for the baby. The carnival had to move on, and the parents asked Mr. and Mrs. Harter to care for the baby while it was sick and said they would come back and get it. They never came back, and before long the baby died. The Harter's buried it in their family plot in Green Mound Cemetery at Harwood. Mr. Harter made a flat stone with the name, Harry Gay, and 1885-1885."

Revolutionary War Military Records

Through a partnership with the National Archives and FamilySearch, Footnote.com, provides original images of Revolutionary War records and makes them available for the first time on the

Mary Alice Jeserick, 2959 West 399 St, LaCygne, KS 66040 majeserick@ckt.net, provides the following: I'm happy to share one of my success stories—

A cousin on my mother's side only knew the names of her grandparents on her father's

side. We're related on her mother's side. I asked if I could research to find their parents and she said, "Fine." She gave me the information that she had, and I began digging. grandparents had lived in Osage township, Bourbon County, Kansas in the 1860's, so I began with census records and grandmother's found the STRICKLAND, in that area. However, the grandfather's family had moved to Vernon County, Missouri. I started checking with the Bushwhacker Museum in Nevada and found probate file David thev had for BLOOMFIELD. This was the father of her grandfather. The file listed his wife and children and, because they were underage when he died, there were also quardians, and affidavits attesting to the 'becoming of age' when they turned 21. From one of those documents I discovered David's wife's maiden name of NUGENT and was able to trace more information about them.

There was also a 1903 plat map for Henry township which was very enlightening to me. My mother grew up in northern Henry township on the Kansas state line. Some years ago she told me she had attended school at Prairie Union School and had walked the two miles to school practically straight east of their home. Being of the generation after coal was stripped from the ground and left huge pits, I pondered how she could have gotten across the pits! She enlightened me. Prairie Union School location is shown on the map along with the former her parents owners of property. great-grandparents grandparents and (WHITE) owned land in that area and are shown on the map. Names that I've heard nearly all my life are shown as landowners, too.

The BRADLEY family lived on the Kansas side of the state line in Linn County and were neighbors to the WHITE family that lived down the road. It is not unexpected that they would meet and marry. My parents bought the

Bradley place, usually referred to as the EPLER place since Isaac Epler homesteaded the farm in 1866, and that is where I grew up.

This is why the local county societies are so very important. It's where the grassroots information is available.
