Renovations at Balltown Cemetery

(Vernon County's Oldest Cemetery) and Use of Ground-Penetrating Radar to Locate Civil War Veterans' Burials

Robert Seater, Metz High School Alumni, retired U.S. Naval officer, and member of the Balltown Cemetery Board, has spearheaded and personally undertaken major renovation and restoration work at the Balltown Cemetery near Horton, MO. Seater has family buried at Balltown.

This cemetery is Vernon County's oldest, being the burial place of 30-year-old Nathaniel



Dodae. Jr.. who died March 23, 1838 from a gunshot wound received in a fight with Indians nine days earlier. (Read more on this in the 1887 History of Vernon Co, p. 159-161.) Dodge's burial is the first known adult burial in the area now Vernon County.

The planned cemetery renovations will include trimming trees, removing overgrown bushes, installing new chain-link fencing, leveling ground, repairing broken gravestones, straightening and leveling gravestones, and installing a monument to honor military veterans. Some of these projects have already been accomplished, and the gravestone restoration work may take four to five years to accomplish, according to Seater.

During the Civil War, Union soldiers stationed at Balltown who were killed or who died from disease were buried here. The cemetery board, first named the Little Osage Literary Society and later changing its name to the Little Osage Cemetery Association, officially donated a 58- by 42-ft. plot of ground G.A.R. Lot, Balltown Cemetery

to the Mt. McGregor Post No. 252 Grand Army of the Republic on April 6, 1898. This plot encompasses the earlier Civil War Union soldiers' burials. Several additional G.A.R. burials were made in the years following the war as veterans passed away.

In researching the G.A.R. lot, it was learned that at one time a fallen gravestone had been re-set in line with other stones (possibly not its correct location) and also that there was no marked for James M. Bradburn, a Union veteran whose 1925 obituary reports that he was buried in the G.A.R. lot.

Seater engaged the engineering firm of



George Butler Associates, Inc., Lenexa, KS, to use ground-penetrating radar to locate burials in the G.A.R. lot. After several weather delays, the company was able to conduct its work on July 17, 2007. The official report of their findings should be available soon.

As part of his persistent cemetery research, Seater located the earliest cemetery records, which are a machine copy of an old ledger book. These records list burials in the oldest, north part of the cemetery, which for many years was not maintained. Additional burials from these records will be included in the new Vernon County cemetery directory currently being prepared. Additionally, these records reveal that the original road into the cemetery was closer to the town of Balltown and cut east-west through the old north section.

If you are curious about this, go about twothirds way into the old north section, and you can see the open space that was the eastwest road. There are burials on the "left" and on the "right" of the access road, which was how they were designated in the early records!

The entire county is indebted to Robert Seater for the restoration and renovation work which he is doing at Balltown Cemetery.

Vernon County 1855-1900 Circuit Court Records Project August 10 Workshop

The first phase of the Circuit Court Records Project has been completed!! *Thank you* to everyone who helped process the case files which included opening, cleaning, reading, and marking them for indexing.

Linda Myers, Missouri State Archivist, will conduct a workshop on August 10 to explain the next step in preparing the records to be indexed and microfilmed. This step will include checking each case file against the index book to ensure correct case numbers.
