Research Assistance in Genealogy Dept.

Items of Interest from Area Newspapers

[The below newspaper articles were transcribed by society members.]

Shot Himself

J. M. Atterbury, who lives west of this city, has received information to the effect that James E. Bond, who disappeared suddenly from here last April, suicided a few weeks ago at some point in the Indian Nation.

Bond had been at work near Gibson, and himself and another man started for Missouri with a wagon. One morning while the companion was preparing breakfast Bond walked behind the wagon and shot himself, the load of shot taking effect above the eye, producing instant death. An examination was had and the jury returned a verdict that Bond came to his death at his own hands, either by accident or with suicidal intent. He had only a few dollars on his person.

Bond was about 28 years old and came here from Mt. Vernon, Ill., and worked in and about Nevada about two years. He raised one crop on Mr. Atterbury's place and when he left here Mr. A. thinks he had several hundred dollars on deposit, but does not know whether he took it with him or not. Bond's leaving was mysterious and has never since been explained.

Some three weeks after he left here he wrote back from Arkansas, saying he had traveled over the greater part of that state. He next turned up in the Indian Nation. The information of his death was sent here by his brother, who lives at Mt. Vernon, III.

A FATAL SALOON FIGHT Barkeeper Cheney Lodges a Pistol Ball Over John Catton's Left Eye.

News reached here this afternoon of a fatal fight which took place last night in a saloon at Carbon Center.

Trouble arose between the barkeeper, Jesse Cheney, and John Catton, and in the row Cheney drew his revolver. Catton attempted to take the pistol from Cheney and was shot just above the left eye, producing a fatal wound. It is said that Catton died soon after the shot was fired.

Cheney is reported under arrest at Rich Hill.

This afternoon Coroner Harris and Prosecuting Attorney Blanton left for Carbon Center. Deputy Sheriff White accompanied them to Rich Hill, and expects to return tonight with Cheney.

JOHN KEATING'S DEATH Particulars of the Tragedy at Carbon Center.

Jesse Cheney an Occupant of the County Jail.

Head Had Orders to Run the House and Did It.

Yesterday afternoon Coroner Harris and Prosecuting Attorney Blanton reached Carbon Center in response to a telegram stating that John Keating had been killed by Jesse Cheney.

The little town was very quiet. Many of the miners had quit work and were standing around in little groups discussing in an undertone, the particulars of their comrade's death. The remains were at a private house and the inquest was almost completed.

Dr. Harris made an examination of the testimony as copied by the clerk, and decided it unnecessary to recall the witnesses. An examination of the body showed that the ball had entered the head at the inner corner of the left eye and ranging backward and upward had fractured the skull, just in front of the crown. The force was insufficient to carry it out, and it fell back into the cavity between the two hemispheres of the brain.

To Dr. Harris we are indebted for the particulars of the difficulty which led to the killing.

The fatal shot was fired in the saloon of Cantrell & Oliver, and resulted from a quarrel between Cantrell and a man named Dodson. They were engaged in a game of dice, and a dispute arose about the status of the play. Cantrell claimed that Dodson owed him twenty cents, and Dodson insisted that

several of the chips in Cantrell's possession belonged to him.

The guarrel grew warm, and Dodson, picking up several pool balls declared that he would have the chips or have blood. At this juncture Jesse Cheney, the barkeeper, interfered by drawing a revolver from beneath the counter, and pointing it at Dodson. He ordered him to lay the balls down. Instead of putting them back in the rack, Dodson walked toward Cheney and laid them on the counter. John Keating was leaning on the counter, and at this moment, seized the revolver with one hand and exclaimed "Don't shoot!" Cheney attempted to pull the weapon away, and though the struggle was scarcely noticeable the revolver was discharged and Keating reeled and fell to the floor with the ball in his head.

When Keating had fallen, Cheney walked out from behind the counter, with the revolver in hand, and in an excited manner exclaimed, "By G__ I was ordered to run this house and I am going to do it."

Those present were frightened by the turn the affair had taken, and for a few moments, it seems that no one but Cheney moved from the places occupied, when the shot was fired. Then Dodson asked Cheney if he could go out of the room. He was told that he could not, but after a few minutes Cheney reconsidered the matter, and told those present that they could go out or come in as they desired.

For nearly a half hour Keating was left where he fell, but was finally taken up and laid on a lounge in the room. The next morning he was removed to a private house and at 11 o'clock, died. He was unconscious from the time he was wounded until death ended his sufferings. His groans, it is said, were very pitiable.

The shooting occurred between 7 and 8 o'clock in the evening and in a few hours after Cheney had given himself up to the officers at Rich Hill.

Keating leaves a wife and two children, and their sorrow over the dead husband and father was very affecting. Soon after he was shot, they were brought from their home a short distance from town and remained with him until he died. They are left in an impoverished condition. The dead man was a coal-miner and had been at work near Carbon Center for several years, having moved from Rich Hill to that place. He was a tall and rather slender man with black hair and mustache, and very prominent features, he was about 35 years old. He was addicted to drinking, but when not under the influence of whiskey was a very agreeable man. He had been drinking at the time he was shot.

It is said that a difficulty had occurred a few hours previous to the shooting between Cheney and Keating, but it was understood that it had been amicably settled before the later and fatal quarrel arose.

CHENEY'S STORY

This morning, Deputy Sheriff White returned from Rich Hill with Jesse Cheney. A Mail reporter saw the prisoner soon after his arrival, and asked his account of the affray.

"It would probably not be best for me to say anything about it, as my attorney prefers that [I] should not," was his answer.

"How long had you been in Carbon Center?"

"Only ten days. I went there from Rich Hill, where I have been at work in various saloons about two years."

"It is rumored," said the reporter, "that Keating is not the first man you have killed."

"That is not true. This is the first trouble that I have ever gotten into. You can trace my life back and find that I am telling the truth. Clif. Davis, who lives in this city, has known me a long time. I used to buy groceries from him years ago."

"Was Keating taking any part in the quarrel when he was shot?" the reporter inquired.

"I did not hear him say a word," was the reply. "I drew the pop on Dodson and expected to bluff him into behaving himself, but, he drew back his hand which held a pool ball, and I expected him to throw it at me. Keating was standing near us, and

grabbed two balls from Dodson and with the other hand grasped the pistol which I held. I attempted to pull it away from him and it went off. The pistol was a self-cocker. I did not cock it before pointing it at Dodson, and do not remember that I did so afterward. When Keating grabbed the balls, I thought he intended helping Dodson, but do not know that he did."

Cheney is about 26 years old, about 5 feet 7 inches in height and wears a light mustache.

Crockett & Smith of Rich Hill have been retained as Cheney's attorneys.
