DNA Genealogy

For those who are using DNA testing to help further their family history research, you may want to follow a free blog by Blaine Bettinger, PhD, JD. He is an instructor for genetic genealogy courses at the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research, Salt Lake Institute of Genealogical Research, Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh, Virtual Institute of Genealogical Research, and Family Tree University. For those unfamiliar with online blogs, go to his website at http://thegeneticgenealogist.com/ to read his previous articles. To subscribe to his blog, scroll down the page to the SUBSCRIBE box on the right side, and enter your email address and click subscribe. When a new article is published, you will receive an email alert.

<u>www.FamilyTreeDNA.com</u> is currently running a summer sale on its Autosomal DNA test commonly referred to as the Family Finder test - \$69. This test finds your DNA matches within five generations with others who have tested. Results include "myOrigins," a mapping tool that provides a detailed ethnic and geographic breakdown of where your ancestors came from. New parental matching feature enables users to sort results by paternal and maternal matches.

<u>Correction</u>: On Saturday your editor attended a DNA seminar at which it was learned that those testing at ancestry.com can, in fact, download their raw data which can then be uploaded to other websites to expand the potential matches, without having to be an ancestry subscriber. The <u>www.familytreedna.com</u> website is now able to receive transfers of recently tested ancestry.com raw data. However, Ancestry does not make it easy to find how to download your raw data, so you should read every word of each email you receive and follow each link that they provide. Somewhere, probably near the bottom of a web page, you will find a link which explains how to download your test results to your computer. Uploading those results to another website such as <u>www.familytreedna.com</u> and <u>www.gedmatch.com</u> is relatively easy.

Newspaper Articles of Interest

The 75th Anniversary Commemoration of World War II is being held 2016-2020. Dec. 7, 2016 marks the 75th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor in Hawaii. Below is an article from the May 31, 1945 issue of the Nevada Daily Mail.

List Of Vernon Countians Who Have Died In Service In World War II

At least a hundred men from Vernon county have died in the service of their country in World War II. Listed below are the names of those men—some of whom are former Vernon Countians; most of whom still made their homes here at the time they entered the service.

The Daily Mail lists these men with the hope that if there have been any omissions, those omissions be called to this newspaper's attention so that the record may be kept straight. Also, any error which might have occurred in the listing should also be reported for correction.

The records will be highly important some day, when the war is over. Later, this newspaper will carry a list of the wounded and missing.
