Neoma Foreman received the *Award of Merit* from the Missouri State Genealogical Association in honor and deep appreciation for her years of meritorious service in the genealogical field in Missouri. The certificate was presented to Neoma by our Society member Marty Patton at the September meeting in Nevada. Marty prepared the nomination which reads:

Neoma Foreman is locally known as one of the most knowledgeable residents in this area in regards to the history of the Walker area as well as Vernon County. Over the years she has been involved in many projects to preserve local history for future generations. Her most recent accomplishment was the publishing of a three-volume set of books titled The Walker Herald, 1892 - 1931 Extant Issues Transcribed that became available in late 2015. Each volume includes an everyname index making it easy for researchers to locate information. Neoma has also compiled and edited four additional local historical books which include:

Readin; Ritin' 'n', 'Rithmetric - The Story of Vernon County's Country Schools; Walker, Missouri 1870 - 1995; and

History of the Walker R-IV School.

Neoma Foreman help compile and co-edited the <u>2010 Vernon County</u>, <u>Missouri Cemetery Directory</u>. In her free time, Neoma writes a weekly local news column as well as a weekly column called Country Living for the Nevada Daily Mail newspaper. She has also written stories for local magazines which often featured local veterans and their stories of valor protecting the freedoms that each and every one of us enjoy daily. Neoma has been writing for over thirty years, sharing and preserving local history and the stories of the residents.

Fold3 is Now Available from Home

Midwest Genealogy Center's public library's database Fold3 Library Edition is no longer an in-Library use only database! This past summer, accessibility of Fold3 Library Edition changed, and now users have full access from home with their Access Pass. Fold3 is a primary source for military records from the Revolutionary War to the present. This database also contains nearly 5 billion records with new records constantly being added, even non-military records like vital records, Native American, African American records, and much more. If you have a Midwest Genealogy Center "Access Pass," you can search Fold3 from your home computer.

Dr. Bettinger has been interviewed and quoted on personal genomics topics in Newsweek, New Scientist, Wired, and others. He authored I Have the Results of My Genetic Genealogy Test, Now What? in 2008, which is distributed by Family Tree DNA to all of their new customers.

Newspaper Articles of Interest

BRONAUGH HAS ANOTHER CALL FROM THIEVES

Robbers broke into the Bronaugh State Bank, the hardware store and the J. B. Hartman grocery store sometime Monday night. Entrance was gained at each

place by the use of skeleton keys, says the Bronaugh Journal. The combination on the outside vault door at the bank was worked and it was uninjured; the inside door was pried open and is badly damaged. The postoffice money was kept in this vault and the box in which it was kept was broken open and about \$26.00 in cash was taken, the stamps were not bothered. Seemingly, no attempt was made to get into the safe. The money drawer at the hardware store was pried off and a little change taken. The Hartman Grocery store was also entered and an attempt made to open the safe, the knob was broken off the safe and it was practically ruined, but they were unable to get the door open. This is the third time within the past two months that our town has been visited by these parties, who are seeking to live off the hard earnings of honest people.
