Newspaper Articles of Interest

Confederate Bonds.

What means the recent increase in the price of bonds issued by the Southern Confederacy during the war? The newspapers say that there is a demand for them in London and New York. Please answer through your newspaper.

Union Soldier.

Sedalia, October 13th, 1881.

It means a ring. When the Southern Confederacy was overthrown in 1865, there were eleven millions of dollars in gold to its credit in the Bank of England. This gold, if it belongs to anybody, belongs to the United States government; but so far the federal authorities have made but slight effort to obtain possession of it. Since 1865 these eleven millions have been drawing interest, and now a ring has been formed consisting of shrewd bankers and speculators in London and New York, to get at this money. The first step in the programme has been to get hold of as many Confederate bonds as possible, and as a matter of course the increase in the demand has made an increase in the price.

This is the whole thing in a nutshell. They will have a good time getting the gold, however. Things are done differently in England from what they are in the United States. Rings do not gather many spoils there. Neither the banks nor the treasury can be raided to any perceptible extent. Old fashioned honesty still abides with the British people. Meanwhile the federal government should look after this money itself. It was as much the property of the Southern Confederacy

as the cannon, the muskets, and ordinance stores, and all the balance of war material which was surrendered at Appomattox. –Sedalia Democrat.
