This will include tasks such as placing documents in protective sleeves and in binders; transferring documents from flimsy binders into heavy-duty binders; arranging pages in alphabetical order and putting in sleeves and binder; removing papers from two file cabinet drawers of file folders; preparing notebook front cover inserts; copying documents; punching holes in documents; etc. We are planning to have numerous tasks identified, labeled, and ready for your willing-worker hands—please plan to help your Society on the 19th. Bring a sack lunch or run out and grab a quick lunch and return. We have the meeting room reserved all afternoon to ensure the projects get completed, so plan to help as long as you can.

Due to the workday activities on Sep 19, there will not be a DNA mini-session. There are tentative plans to have a DNA session following the October meeting in El Do.

The Nevada Library Genealogy Department is open to researchers during all regular Library hours. Free wi-fi is available for those who bring a personal device. Two

computers in the Genealogy Dept. are available exclusively for genealogy research. A 12-month library card can be obtained at the circulation desk free of charge for those living within Nevada and for \$25 if you live outside of Nevada. Or, one free limited guest pass can be obtained each month to use the library computers.

A sample report is available for you to download and read; there is no guarantee prior to purchase as to exactly what would be in any other report.

Newspaper Articles of Interest

--The Kansas *Conservative* of the 15th Inst., says a fight occurred between a band of guerrillas and the 3d Wisconsin cavalry, a short time since, near the junction of the Marmaton and Osage, in Missouri. The fight lasted an hour and a half, resulting in the rout of the guerillas. They lost five killed and three wounded, among the former, Pony Hill, a noted rebel. The third lost one man killed, J. H. Robinson of Co. E.

Chicago Daily Tribune, Chicago, Illinois; 21 July 1863.

[A later Nevada Daily Mail newspaper article notes that Pony Hill was killed sometime following the war in Arkansas. The Cpt. Charles W. Porter Civil War diary, *In the Devil's Dominions: A Union Soldier's Adventures in "Bushwhacker Country,"* edited and annotated by Patrick Brophy, reports that on July 12, 1863, Porter learned that Cpt. Pratt of Co F, 3rd Wisconsin had been scouting east of Balltown and had a skirmish resulting in one of his men killed and five enemy wounded and two more killed while trying to cross the Osage. This editor has not had access to sufficient Civil War records to confirm who "J. H. Robinson" was or where he was buried.]

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
