Society Meeting: Wednesday, 21 June 2023 The Cedar & Vernon Co MO Genealogical Society meeting will be held Wed, 21 June 2023, in the Nevada Library's Maker Space (the smaller meeting room, west of the Annex). Enter at the doors on Walnut Street, in the middle of the block, which are also the Museum's Walnut St. entrance. The doors will open at 9:30 a.m., and the meeting will begin at 10 a.m. The program will focus on gleaning family history information from old newspapers.

As a follow-up to Laura's May program, the Nevada Library Genealogy Dept has a copy of The Douglas Register which she referenced. The complete title and information about this reference is: "The Douglas register, being a detailed record of births, marriages and deaths together with other interesting notes, as kept by the Rev. William Douglas, from 1750 to 1797. An index of Goochland wills. Notes on the French Huguenot refugees who lived in Manakin-By Douglas, William, 1708-1798. town. Publication date 1928." This is a valuable reference for those with ancestors in Virginia during the 1700s.

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Operation 85. The following are excerpts from a recent fold3.com blog and appropriate as a follow-up to Memorial Day in which we remember and honor service members who made the ultimate sacrifice while serving our country. "The telegram arrived on a cold January day in 1942. It read, "After an exhaustive search, it has been found impossible to locate your son, Robert Edwin Kline, gunner's mate, second class, U.S. Navy." The sailor's mother refused to accept the news and continued to hold out hope. How could it be? Bobby was just 22. Robert Edwin Kline was one of 1,177 sailors and Marines killed in the attack on the USS Arizona at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941

Most of the sailors killed aboard the Arizona went down with the ship. However, the bodies of 85 (and possibly as many as 150) were buried, their remains unidentified and comingled, in graves at the National Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu.

DNA technology did not exist in the 1940s, but more recent advances now make it possible to identify those previously unknown. That's where Operation 85 comes in. ...facilitating the effort to find surviving family members and connecting them with the DPAA to take a DNA test. The DPAA administers the DNA tests at no cost to participants. "

While transcribing family letters which had been written during that timeperiod, Society member Terresa E. inquired about two brothers from this area who also lost their lives on the *USS Arizona* -- Raymond Virgil Wells Jr. and William Bennett Wells. 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Family Bibles. When copying/photographing a Family Bible, the front cover and title/publication pages should be copied if at all possible. If the front title page with year of publication is missing, look in the middle of the Bible for the title page in front of the New Testament. The attribution of Bible ownership can sometimes be more correctly made based on the year of publication.

An article at Familytreemagazine.com said that the first Bible printed in the U.S. was in 1782; and in 1791 the first "Family Bible" with pages to record births, marriages, and deaths was printed and sold by door-to-door salesmen. A Bible was often given to a couple at their marriage to record their Family's information over the years with their date of marriage being the first entry.


When looking at an old Family Bible, consider if the entries were all made at the same time in the same handwriting or were they made over a span of years by different people/writing styles and ink?


# Hugh McDermid Caton and Nancy Ann (Harvey) Caton Family Bible and Transcription

Upon the 1894 death of Hugh Caton in Vernon County, Missouri, the Family Bible was in the possession of his widow, Nancy Ann (Harvey) Caton, who later moved to Arkansas City, Kansas, where she lived with her son-in-law and daughter, William Parman and Mary Ann Caton Parman; and the Bible passed to them at her death. From William and Mary Ann Caton Parman, the Bible passed to their son, Luther E. Parman after which it passed to his son, Luther Hays Parman, where it was viewed and the Family Record pages photographed in 2008. The Bible remained in the possession of Luther H. Parman in Arkansas City, Kansas, until his death in 2014 at which time it passed to his nephew. These pages are from that Bible.

On February 12, 1918, the Army issued General Order No. 27, which read: "All soldiers of the United States Army will be numbered by or before February 28, 1918...as soon as a number is assigned to a soldier, it will become a part of his official designation, never changed, never reassigned to another soldier".
