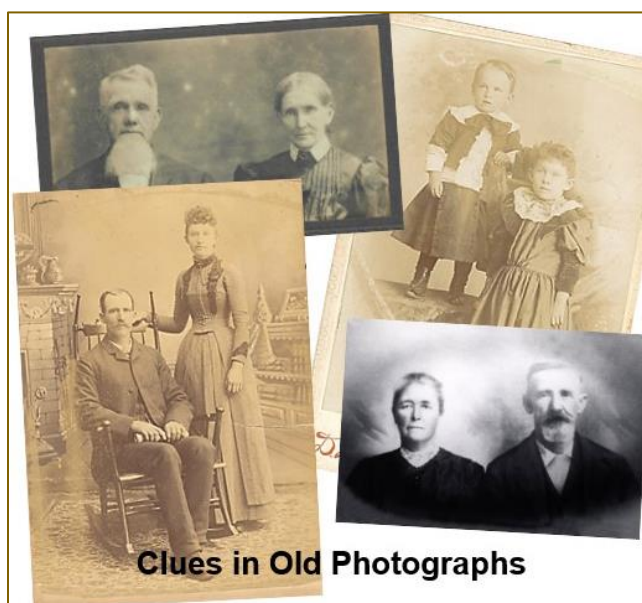

Free Program

Newspaperwoman of the Ozarks: The Life and Times of Lucile Morris Upton. Thursday, March 21, 7 p.m.; duration 1 hour. Lucile Morris Upton landed her first newspaper job out West in the early 1920s, then returned home to spend half a century reporting on

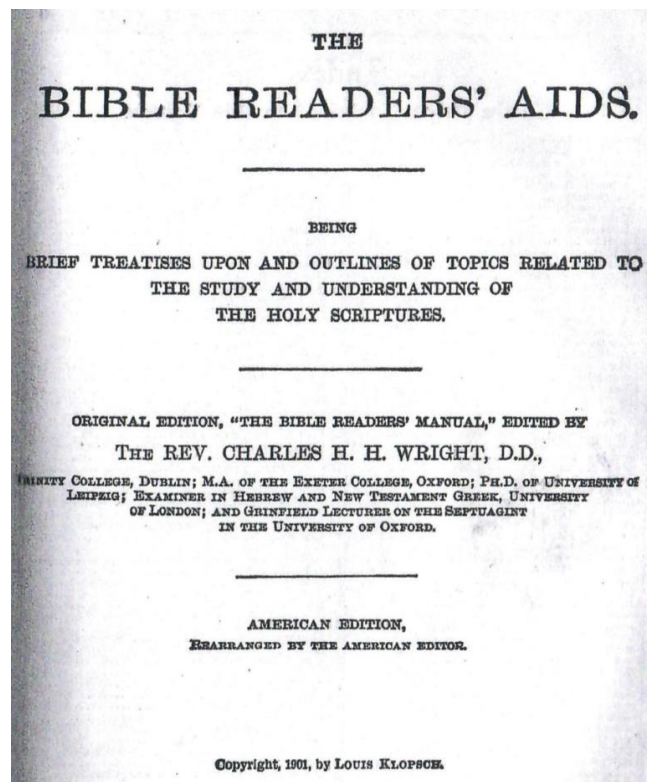
the Ozarks world she knew best. Having come of age just as women gained the right to vote, she took advantage of the opportunities that presented themselves in a changing world. During

her years as a journalist, Upton rubbed shoulders with presidents, flew with aviation pioneer Wiley Post, covered the 20th century's worst single killing of U.S. police officers, wrote an acclaimed book on the Bald Knobbers vigilante group, charted the growth of Ozarks tourism and spearheaded a movement to preserve iconic regional history sites. Following retirement from her newspaper career, she put her experience to good use as a community activist and member of the Springfield City Council. Told largely through Upton's own words, Susan Croce Kelly's insightful biography captures the excitement of front lines newsgathering in the days when the whole world depended on newspapers to learn of current events.

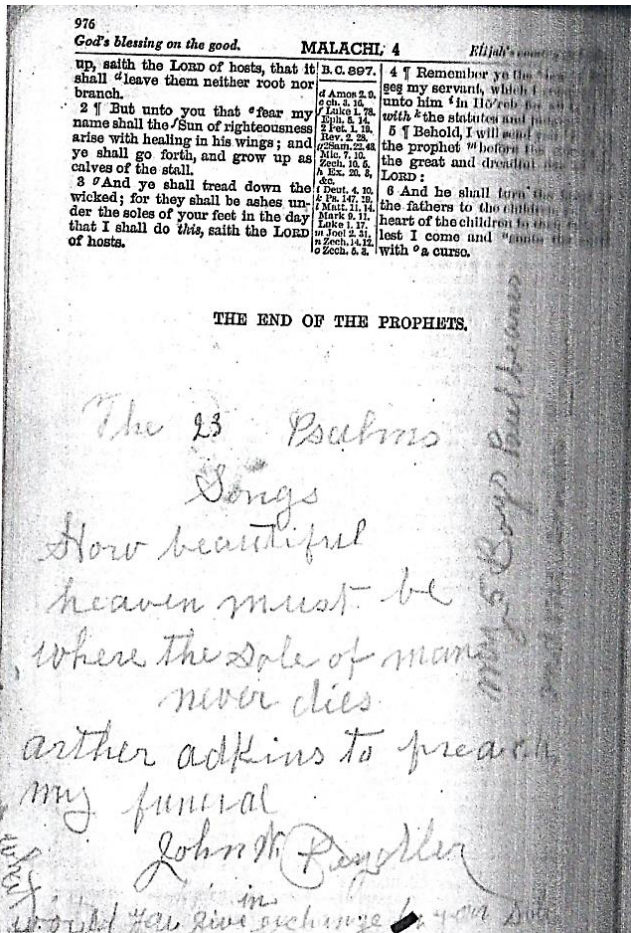

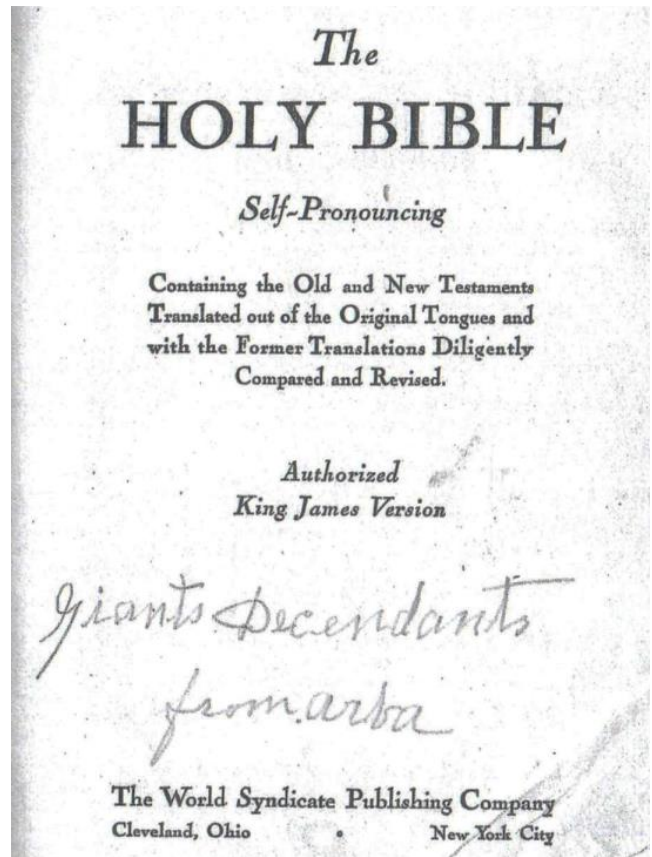

Newspaper Article

A WILD RACE The Drive of a Fugitive Maniac in Steward Cumming's Buggy.

The insane man who escaped from the asylum yesterday was named Weber and was sent here from Kansas City. He was permitted to go into the corridor to smoke and escaped from that section of the building.

As soon as he reached the open air, Weber saw Steward Coming's horse and buggy standing in front of the institution. In an instant he was in possession of the rig and was driving across the farm to the west at a wild rate of speed. He was seen by several persons in the building and in a short time men were in pursuit. The wild race continued out to the Iron Bridge road and then across the river into the bottom. Instead of keeping [to] the main road, the crazy man turned into a road which is but little traveled and pursued a north course.

When about half way across the bottom, Weber ran into a stump, wrecked the buggy and was

thrown out over the dash board. The insane driver picked himself up and continued his journey to the north on foot. He was caught about two o'clock by Attendants Hill and Lovell in a field owned by Mr. Pence. He did not offer any resistance, and quietly returned with his captors. He was trying to make his way back to Kansas City and did not err in the direction.

The buggy and horse were found where they had collided with the stump. The horse was very much fatigued, but not permanently injured by the long run. The axle, dash board and shafts of the buggy were broken and the harness also in bad shape.

The experience of those who were coming into the city and met the crazy fugitive, is quite interesting. Some thought he was a doctor and others recognized that he was insane, but all gave the road with remarkable celerity.
