This restoration project is ongoing, and much additional preservation work is yet to be done.

An open house to view the photos, trophies, and new trophy cases will be held at the Metz Bank at Metz on Saturday afternoon, June 4, from 2 p.m. until 3 p.m., before the alumni dinner.

### History of Metz School

The first school in this area (c. 1830s) was taught in the home of Jesse Summers by Mary Choates, who later became Mrs. Leonard Dodge. The first school house, a small log building, was built at the Summers graveyard, some time after the year 1840. Mrs. Eliza Summers was one of the first teachers, and Peter Weyand was another early teacher.

A square 2-story grade school building was erected in the northwest part of Metz



and was used until the schools of Metz Township were consolidated.

From school year 1911-12 till 1915-16, high school classes were taught on and off to tuition pupils at Metz.

In April 1916 Metz township voted to consolidate the elementary districts to form a public high school. Districts in the Township were Dell, Metz, Old Metz, Pryor Creek, Rinehart, Stoney Point, White Rock, and Whitfield. Classes began September 11, 1916 with 10 pupils. High school was held in the Irl Hudson house and the Town Hall until Aug. 1927 upon completion of the new



two-story Metz High School building, contracted by Walter W. Kelly at a cost of \$40,000.

The country grade schools of the township were discontinued in 1940, and three new rooms were added to the north end of the high school to house the grade pupils. Over the years our district took in more territory including other country schools in Lake, Washington, Osage and Henry townships. Expansion became necessary so a new structure east of the high school was built, with rooms for the first six grades and a regulation size gymnasium. First classes



were held in the new building in the fall of 1953 and Metz became District R-2.

In May 1984 the Metz School Board members voted to discontinue Metz High School, and high school pupils attended school in adjoining districts. The 1984 graduating class had four pupils.

In 1992 Metz was annexed into the Nevada School District.

The school property has since been sold to private individuals, and the 2-story high school building torn down.

### The Metz Times Newspaper

J. D. Williams assumed management of *The Metz Times* from W. A. Logan on May 27, 1904. The first press of *The Metz Times* was turned by hand and printed one page at a time. Following the death of his uncle, J. D. Williams, it was edited and printed by Clay Dryden Baze, better known as "Bud."

The *Metz Times* was the last hand set newspaper in Missouri.

In 1972, a stroke caused Bud's retirement. *The Metz Times* was then printed by the Rich Hill Review and later by the Nevada News until it was discontinued in 1980.

Extant copies of the newspaper were microfilmed by the State Historical Society of Missouri; and a copy of that microfilm has recently been acquired by the Tri-County Genealogical Society (the local genealogy society), and will soon be catalogued and available for use in the Nevada Library's Genealogy Department.

## History of Metz (Pleasant Valley), Missouri

In 1829 when Jesse J., Moses, and Allen Summers and their families settled on the Osage River, this area was part of Jackson County; and the Osage Indians were their neighbors. Later the area became part of Van Buren County, and then it was Bates County. Finally, in 1855 Vernon County was officially organized.

As more settlers arrived in this area following the Civil War, a small town called Pleasant Valley was laid out on Reeds Creek, 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> miles east of the present day Metz. In 1870 a Post Office was established; however, the name had to be changed because Pleasant Valley was already in use. D. P. Swearingen, whom many knew as "Uncle Dave" and who operated a general merchandise store there, was chosen as postmaster. He suggested the name "Metz" after reading about Metz, France, in the Franco-Prussian War news, and the name was accepted.

A fine steam-planning mill operated on Reeds Creek at that time and gave the village of Pleasant Valley some notoriety and attracted much business.

On the 1870 Federal Population Census, the following occupations are listed for persons living in this area: farmer, farm hand, harness maker, painter, merchant, carpenter, school teacher, physician, miller, blacksmith, and cabinet maker.

By 1880, Metz Township listed the following occupations in addition to those in the 1870 census: hotel clerk, laborer, stonemason, druggist, grocer, store clerk, engineer, and stock dealer.

In 1890 the Missouri Pacific Rail Road was built and bypassed Metz about 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> miles to the west. Dr. G. W. Petty was the first to move his store building to the railroad, and the new town of Metz was soon laid out.

In 1907, Metz was incorporated as a town.

The 1911 History of Vernon County says the following about what Metz has: The Metz "Times" published by J. D. Williams; one bank, two mills, two hotels, one garage, no saloons, an ice man, one railroad, a newspaper, a brass band, one drug store, three painters, a harness shop, three churches, an opera house, four carpenters, good sidewalks, one undertaker, six secret orders, one lumber yard, one barber shop, three physicians, one butcher shop, no booze-fighters, a good town well, four stock buyers, good mail service, hospitable people, night mail service, one machine shop, two livery stables, a commercial club, no dependent poor, two grocery stores, two paper-hangers, two photographers, three general stores, well improved streets, good roads diverging, one express company, two blacksmith shops, three Sunday schools, one implement dealer, three hardware stores, an active W.C.T.U., a good baseball team, one water-filter factory, three insurance agents, almost 500 population, best farming community, three real estate dealers, one exclusive millinery store, three contractors and builders, two church ladies' aid societies, one job printing office-the "Times," no empty business or resident houses, no debts, money in town treasury, beautiful modern and comfortable homes, Christian Endeavor Society and Epworth League, one telephone company with a list of 250 subscribers, a good school building with an addition to be built soon, no more gentlemanly nor accommodating merchants anywhere.

### Memorabilia

There will be space for some school memorabilia in the new trophy case display at the Metz Bank. If you have items which you would like to donate, please bring or send them to the upcoming meeting. Suggested items are sports letter, band medals, etc.

## Bushwhacker Museum and Jail

While in town for the Metz Alumni reunion, plan to visit the Bushwhacker Museum and

Jail in Nevada. The Museum is located on the lower level of the Finis Moss Building (the Nevada Library), next



to the Community Center. The Bushwhacker Museum and Jail are open from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., Monday-Saturday. Admission is \$3 per person. Visitors begin their tour in the museum and are then taken to the old Jail building, at the other end of the block, to conclude the tour. The Jail has



been almost completely restored and furnished according to its late 19<sup>th</sup>-century

use as a jail and living quarters. Many new permanent and temporary exhibits may be seen in the Museum. For questions call the Museum at 667-9602 or 667-8425.
